April Meeting Highlights

Community Living Centers care is often free



What if you needed rehabilitation care after surgery and went to a private facility that charged over \$100,000 and you could have gotten that care at a Veterans facility for free? That has happened to some Veterans who were not familiar with Veterans' services offered at Colorado State Veterans Community Living Centers, according to guest speakers at the April meeting.

Tamara Hoehn and Rose Campbell, representing the Community Living Centers, told chapter members about the services offered at these facilities. Chapter board member Pat Hammon, who is very involved with this organization, introduced the speakers (see photo at left).

For Veterans who have 70 percent service-connected disabilities, care is free of charge at the living centers and income and resources are not considered, Hoehn said. There are beds available at the centers, she added.

Services offered include:

- Medical: 24-hour nursing care, individual care plans, mental health support, in-house pharmacy, short-term rehabilitation, end-of-life hospice care, memory care.
- Therapeutic: physical, occupational, speech and oxygen therapy
- Recreational: day trips and events, recreational activities, in-house transportation
- Other: Meals and snacks, cleaning and laundry, barbershop, beauty parlor, spiritual programs, garden areas, library

For those without 70 percent service-connected disability, the centers accept Medicaid, Medicare, private pay and VA benefits. Daily rates cover extras, including all medications, primary care physician services, oxygen, wheelchairs and other supplies, therapies, transportation to medical appointments and more.

To give caregivers of Veterans a break, the Veterans can stay from a

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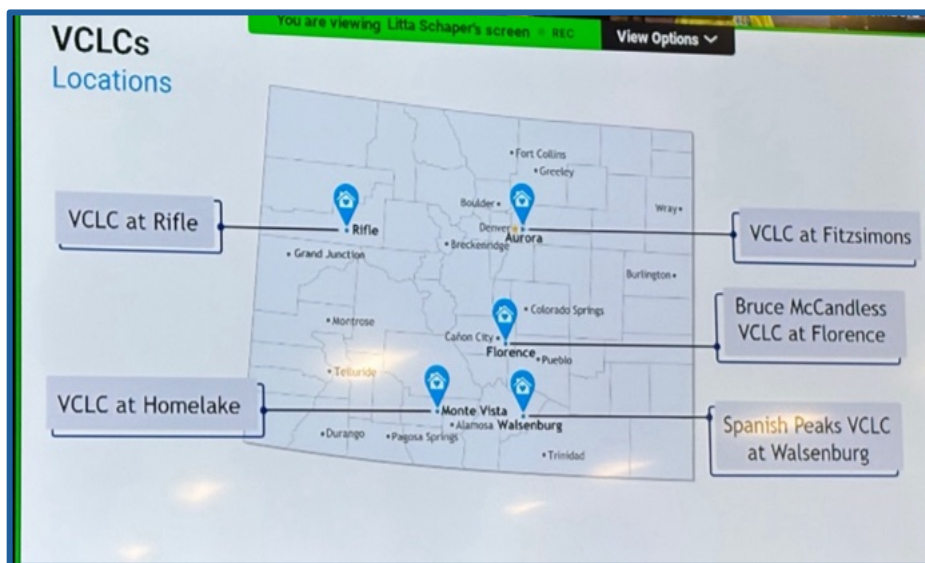

week to a month at Living Centers. Several Veterans who were at Fitzsimons for respite liked it so much they decided to stay long-term, Campbell said.

There are five Veterans Community Living Centers in Colorado (Fitzsimons, Florence, Homelake, Rifle and Walsenburg). Each provides short-term rehabilitation and long-term nursing care. Each home has a team of physicians, nurses and therapists to provide necessary health care.

Veterans are welcome to visit the CLCs and have lunch or dinner with residents. McBride presents tribute marking Vietnam Veterans Day

Jules McBride of At Home Hospice honored chapter members with a Welcome Home tribute marking the 23rd anniversary of March 29, 1973, the date the last of the U.S. combat troops left the

Republic of Vietnam. That date was made a national holiday in 2017. Though the combat troops were withdrawn in 1973, April 30, 1975 is recognized as the official end of the war, following a major offensive by the North Vietnamese Army into South Vietnam.

The war, which lasted from 1955 to 1975, killed millions of people and injured many more. More than 58,000 military personnel were killed in action and 153,372 sustained injuries requiring hospitalization. A draft was instituted during the war and affected millions of young Americans. This war without borders involved guerilla tactics as well as traditional warfare, resulting in numerous casualties and long-term mental and physical challenges. Most U.S. Veterans returned to a less than favorable reception and many had injuries that are still being discovered and treated. Those exposed to herbicides such as Agent Orange are still suffering and dying as a result of their service in the war.

Today, Vietnam Veterans Day is celebrated throughout the country with ceremonies, parades, and other events paying homage to Veterans of the war.

McBride presented a Welcome Home pin to each member present and a certificate of appreciation to President Dave Lyons honoring all veterans and Chapter 1106. She also left us with the following tribute for National Vietnam War Veterans Day, March 29.

At Home Hospice is located in Denver and provides specialized comfort care for patients with terminal illnesses (typically six months or less to live) in their own homes, nursing facilities or assisted living. McBride said, "Please let me know if anyone is ever in need of hospice or has any questions on end-of-life care. I am happy to be a resource and navigate these hard conversations." McBride can be reached at (720) 459-7912.

March Member Bio

Moriarty describes family military history, service as nurse



Chapter member Francis Moriarty included a tribute to his family's military legacy as he presented his bio at the March meeting. Francis, who served as a member of the US Army Medical Corps, also gave us a look into his activities as an Army nurse in Honolulu as well as with a Dust-Off unit in Vietnam and on board The Sanctuary. He had follow-up assignments in the US, Korea and Germany.

He began his family's military history with Corp. Michael Sullivan, his grandfather who served under Gen. Pershing in WWI. Tragically, he was killed in combat in 1918, two weeks before the war ended. Francis's mother never had the chance to meet her father. Sgt. Joe Braken, his mother's cousin, survived the Bataan Death March in WWII. He weighed 80 pounds when he returned from the war and died two years later.

In addition, Francis's father, Nick Moriarty, served as a police officer in Marlborough, Massachusetts.

Francis was born in 1943 and joined the nurse corps. After basic training and field service school at Fort Sam Houston in Texas, he served 3 years in Hawaii. After an anesthesia residency, "Capt. Moe" was assigned to the 18th Surgical MASH unit in Vietnam, where he took care of wounded and dying military personnel as well as wounded children from the local area.

He rode with the 237th Medical Detachment, also known as DMZ Dust-Off, which was a US Army air ambulance unit recognized for critical medical evacuations in dangerous zones near the DMZ, along the border with North Vietnam. Five pilots and 10 crew members were killed while he served in this region of intense fighting. His memories also include the deaths of 10 nurses killed in crashes and in combat.

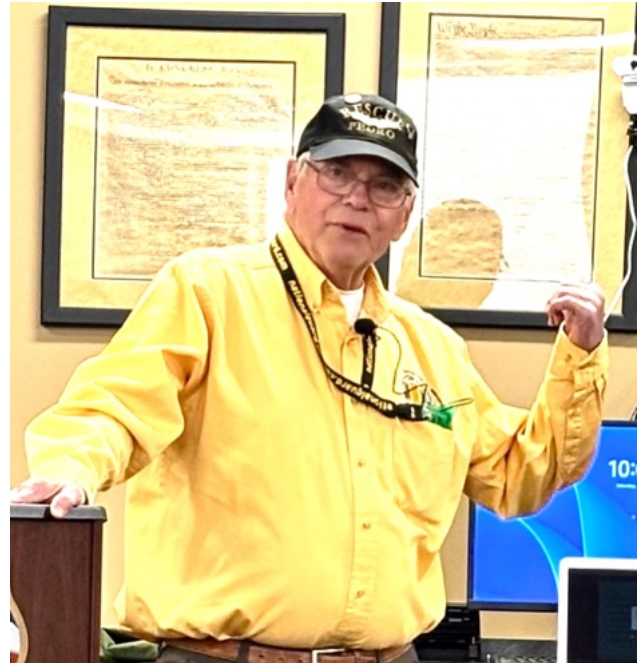
His service also included assignments in Walter Reed National Military Medical Center in Maryland, Ft. McClelland in Alabama, Fort Sill in Oklahoma, and Fitzsimons Army Medical Center in Aurora. He retired as a Lieutenant Colonel in 1981 to Port Charlotte, FL. After Hurricane Helene brought two feet of water into his home in 2024, he and his wife Elsie moved to the Denver area, where three of their five children live. Elsie, also a member of Chapter 1106, was an Army nurse and served two tours in Vietnam.

April Member Bio

Dempsey served in Air Force, local bomb squad

Joe Dempsey, bio speaker for April, comes from a military family. His father served in the Air Force after joining the service at age 18 during WWI. His two brothers served in the Navy. Joe enlisted in the Air Force in April 1969 in New York City. He was an Aero-Medical Technician providing support to physicians with vaccines, medical records and sick call. He was also the medical personnel on HH-43 Huskie ambulance helicopters. These were the first rescue helicopters in Vietnam and were used in more rescues than any other aircraft in that war.



His tour of duty also included Guam and Thailand. He served at Bergstrom Air Force Base in Texas from 1971 to 1973.

After leaving service, he served with the NYPD from 1973 to 1975, then with the Arapahoe County Sheriff's Office from 1976 to 2007. He eventually was trained and became part of the County's bomb squad. From 2000 to 2025 he served as Subject Matter Expert for the Department of Homeland Security, providing instruction on bomb incident response.

Post retirement, he has held various positions with other organizations, including the University of Denver, the National Institute of Justice, and the Department of Homeland Security.

Book remembers Forgotten Heroes from Vietnam War

Biography

Mike was born in 1950. He worked for the Bridgemen Ice Cream Co. & U.S. Steel Co. prior to enlisting in Air Force. Basic training was at Lackland AFB, San Antonio, Texas. Mike was later sent to Laredo AFB, Texas. There he was assigned to Detachment 10 (DET) of the Military Air Lift Command. DET is a HH-43B rescue operation for further training in the Air Rescue & Recovery techniques. The following are a few of the topics he studied: Air Rescue, Crash Rescue, ARF science/rescue man techniques, ground/flight transition courses, jungle survival school, Fighter Aircraft weapons systems and canopy/ejection seat function training. His next assignment was in 1970 to Udorn & NKP Thailand. Mike was sent overseas and flew over and thru the wonderful Agent Orange-soaked jungles of Thailand & Vietnam – looking for downed planes and performing inflight fueling. Some of the missions in Vietnam were at or on the way to Da Nang, Cam Ranh Bay, Phan Rang & Saigon. He also spent time in Laos, Guam & the Philippines. His last military assignment was at Duluth AFB, Minnesota, to end his AF career. He was then hired at the same location as a DoD Civilian FF. After 3 years he moved on to 10 years with the city of Duluth as a fire fighter. Mike moved to Colorado in 1989 and retired in 2010. He has been active in several Masonic Lodges, VFW, VVA & other civic associations. Mike has a wonderful son, Nick, & 2 fantastic granddaughters that he is very proud of and enjoys spending time with them whenever he can.



James Emmett Weekes

Sergeant (E-5), US Marine Corps
Dates of Service: 03JUN68 – 02JUN72
Place of Birth: Allegan, Michigan

Biography

Jim was born in 1950. He enlisted as soon as he received his grades, preferring to march on the grinder at MCRD San Diego in lieu of marching in graduation ceremonies at his high school. He endured recruit training for 2 months, and especially liked infantry training for 2 months at Camp Pendleton, California. After a short stay with Fox Company, he was deployed to Vietnam, and joined Golf Company, 2nd Battalion of the 9th Marine Regiment as a rifleman. Jim carried the 1st squad radio and eventually was assigned to carry the 1st platoon radio. He was exposed to the most strenuous conditions that combat had to offer – facing death on numerous occasions – while on “search & destroy” combat operations ranging throughout the NW portions of the I Corp, bordered by the DMZ and Laos. The carnage was indescribable, and many marines were killed/maimed for life. The Marines were living one day at a time – praying to make it to the next day. Jim developed PTSD and it has followed him his entire life. Also, he has suffered numerous ailments from the toxins of Agent Orange. After leaving Vietnam in 1970, he changed his MOS from that of a 3011 Rifleman to that of a 4641 Combat Photographer. Jim was trained as a motion picture and photographer at Lowry AFB and served in the 2nd Marine Division with operations out of Camp Lejeune, North Carolina, until his discharge in 1972.

Forgotten Heroes Campaign honors Veterans with ceremony, service medals

The above are entries from the book, which includes stories of 145 Veterans honored by the Forgotten Heroes Campaign. 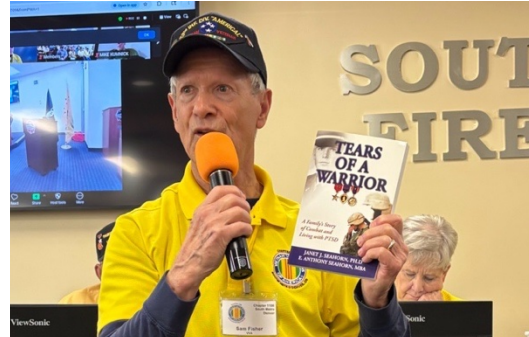
Trip to Animal Sanctuary May 20

"Our desire and mission with Quilts of Valor is to cover all service members and Veterans touched by war with a comforting and healing quilt." The quilts take six months to a year to complete, including choosing fabrics, cutting and sewing to make tops, machine quilting, and binding. Some 439,000 quilts have been given nationally.

The Veterans Coalition has 28 members and is working on a strategic plan. There is a problem in that the state-level Veterans funding is short of funds and cuts are expected. There is a bill proposed at the Federal level to open Veterans courts at each judicial level. Also, the coalition is looking at the Richard Starr Act referring to retirement pay and concurrent disability pay.

There is also a move to delineate between a disabled Veterans license plate and a Veterans plate. Lastly, the State of Colorado has dissolved the previous committee overseeing the Veterans Memorial at the State Capitol and put it under the Department of Education for better representation.
